

FURNISHINGS REQUIRED TO COMPLETE TOLLKEEPER'S COTTAGE

All must date 1860 or earlier. Can be in poor condition but usable.

wooden washtub
 wooden washboard
 wooden water pails with handles
 adult size wooden yoke
 homemade soap
 2 cast iron trivets
 ash shovel for stove
 flint for starting fire -
 pictures on walls
 3-4 wall sconces for candles, tin
 pure beeswax candles (not modern manufacture)
 tableware: dinner/luncheon plates, bowls, cups and saucers, some serving dishes, pitcher,
 creamer, sugar bowl, teapot, platters, some glasses – *no cutlery please* – mismatched
 pan for separating cream from milk
 washstand set (basin, jug at least – mismatched, unmarked)
 clothing: men, women, children – incl. nightwear, boots/shoes/moccasins, hats, shawls
 plank: 1-1 ½ inches thick, 18 inches wide x 24 inches deep, old weathered wood - sign
 old, battered cowbell (we have horsebells)
 wooden mallet
 a burl maul or froe club
 quill pens
 child's rag doll
 old jackknife for whittling

white pure cotton sheets for beds, can be machine-stitched but will need to be ripped out
 and replaced with hand-stitching, enough for 2 large beds and pillowcases
 more cotton or wool or silk fabrics for rug-making – furnishings plus workshops

(A washstand set was offered by very a visitor but has not been brought to us. There is
 more cast ironware to come but a *very* large pot is still needed – the type for boiling down
 maple sap.)
